Rafał Rosół: The Origins of the "Scapegoat" Ritual in Ancient Greecep. 280. The author puts forward the hypothesis that the "scapegoat" ritual had been introduced to Greece under the influence of the Phoenicians. That opinion is based on five arguments: 1. the etymology of the term συβάκχος (connected with Hebr. zebah and Phoen. zbh 'sacrifice'); 2. the great role of the number seven at the "scapegoat" ritual in Greece and at the Semitic rituals (including the scapegoat rituals in the Old Testament); 3. the possibility that the god Apollo and some elements of his cult originate in Phoenicia; 4. the presence of the scapegoat ritual in Syria-Palestine (beginning from the third millennium B.C.); 5. the fact that there were some cultural connections between the Phoenicians and the Ionians in the early Iron Age.
